### **Polar Bears and Seabirds of Svalbard Presented by Sherry Schmidt**

### **Local Sightings: Fall 2018** by Tom Benson

This issue of local sightings covers fall migration from mid August to mid December. Due to space limitations, this report covers only the very rare or more interesting species, with marginally rare or regularly occurring rarities omitted.

It was a better than average fall for diving ducks in San Bernardino County, with two WHITE-WINGED SCOTER at Harper Dry Lake/Kramer Junction Nov 12-25, another one at Silver Lakes Nov 21, a BLACK SCOTER at Parker Dam Nov 4-Dec 8, and a LONG-TAILED DUCK at Kramer Junction Nov 20-25. Two SANDHILL CRANES, rare in migration anywhere in the county, were at Zzyzx Nov 23-28. A HUDSONIAN GODWIT put in a brief appearance at Kramer Junction Aug 17 (see photo) providing only the second record for the county. Lake Havasu hosted a PARASITIC JĂEGER Sep 10-16 and a BLUE-FOOTED BOOBY Sep 13-23. A LONG-TAILED JAEGER at Big Bear Lake Aug 29-Sep 9 was an excellent bird for the mountains. A NEOTROPIC CORMORANT at Glen Helen Regional Park continuing through Oct 31 provides one of a few records for the coastal slope of the county. A WILLIAMSON'S SAPSUCK-ER in Ontario Nov 4-23 was notable for being in the coastal lowlands. The highlight of the fall may have been an ALDER FLYCATCHER at Chet Huffman Park Aug 30; pending CBRC review it would be a first county record. A LEAST FLYCATCHER spent a little time on the San Bernardino County side of

Crystal Springs Aug 31-Sep 1. A TROPICAL KINGBIRD was at Zzyzx Sep 5-7, providing a rare desert record of this species. Corvids staged a minor invasion into the coastal lowlands with up to seven STELLER'S JAYS in Yucaipa Aug 15-Dec 11 and up to four at Glen Helen Regional Park Oct 17-Nov 27, along with a CLARK'S NUTCRACKER at the latter location Oct 31-Nov 7. A LAPLAND LONGSPUR was at Luckie Park Nov 23-25. Single AMERICAN TREE SPARROWS were at Zzyzx Oct 20 and Knott Sky Park Nov 4; both were one -day wonders. A SAGEBRUSH SPARROW was at Montecito Memorial Park Oct 20-21, providing the first coastal slope record for the county of this normally desert-dwelling bird. An ORCHARD ORIOLE was at Harper Dry Lake Sep 11 while a BALTIMORE ORIOLE was at Chet Huffman Park Oct 10. The Baker sewage ponds played host to three RUSTY BLACKBIRDS with up to two females Oct 26-Nov 1 and a male Nov 10-14. Notable vagrant warblers included a YELLOW-THROATED WARBLER at Baker Nov 7-10, a BLACK-THROATED GREEN WARBLER near Seven Oaks Sep 6, a CAPE MAY WAR-Cape May Warbler BLER at Zzyzx Oct 14 (see photo), and a PAINTED REDSTART at Chet Huffman Park Sep 14. Single DICKCISSELS were at Zzyzx Sep 5 and at the Christopher Lindsey Baker sewage ponds Oct 9.



Scoters also put in a good showing in Riverside County with anywhere from four to nine WHITE-WINGED SCOTERS at the north end of the Salton Sea Nov 3-Dec 10 and two to three BLACK SCO-TERS in the same area Nov 28-Dec 8. A MOUNTAIN PLOVER at North Shore Sep 23 was away from expected areas of occurrence. A RUFF was at the San Jacinto Wildlife Area (SJWA) Oct 7. It was a banner year for BUFF-BREASTED SANDPIPERS in California in general, but one at the SJWA Sep 18-

30 (see photo) was the only one reported in the tri-county area. A RED PHALAROPE was at Desert Center Sep 16. Rare gulls in Riverside County included a LITTLE GULL at SJWA Sep 30, a SABINE'S GULL on Lake Elsinore Oct 4, a HEERMANN'S GULL at the Salton Sea SRA Nov 24, a MEW GULL in Lakeview Dec 13, and a WESTERN GULL at Lake Perris Dec 1, along with two PARASITIC JAEGERS at the north end of the Salton Sea Sep 26-Oct 3. Rounding out the non-passerines, up to four PACIFIC LOONS were at Lake Perris Nov 13-Dec 11, a REDDISH EGRET was at Palo Verde Ecological Reserve Sep 15, and a ZONE-TAILED HAWK was at Mayflower Park Oct 18. Rare on the coastal slope, a VERDIN was in Moreno Valley Sep 29. Desert Center hosed a GRASSHOPPER SPARROW

Oct 13 and two different HARRIS'S SPARROWS Oct 21 and 29. Vagrant warblers included a TENNES-SEE WARBLER at SJWA Sep 9 and a VIRGINIA'S WARBLER there Sep 8-9, a PROTHONOTARY WAR-BLER at a backyard birdbath in Temecula Sep 22-26, a BLACKPOLL WARBLER at Chiriaco Summit Sep 6, a BLACKBURNIAN WARBLER in Moreno Valley Sep 24-26, a CHESTNUT-SIDED WARBLER at Lake Skinner Oct 7-14, a BLACK-THROATED GREEN WARBLER at Lake Hemet Oct 7, and a MAGNOLIA WARBLER at North Shore Oct 24-28. Two DICKCISSELS were at Desert Center Sep 23.

#### JANUARY/FEBRUARY 2019 FIELD TRIPS

### Saturday, January 5, 2019 - 7:00 am Salton Sea Goose & Crane Trip Chet McGaugh (951) 781-3699 & Gene Cardiff (909) 875-5358

This trip at times has been called the "waterfowl trip," the "goose trip," and "a wonderful field trip." It is all of that, and more. Perhaps a glimpse at some of the species seen on previous trips will help stoke the fires of desire: American White Pelican (hundreds), American Bittern, White-faced Ibis, Roseate Spoonbill, Snow Goose tions on the pier and hope that it warms during the (thousands), Ross's Goose (hundreds), Greater Whitefronted Goose, Bald Eagle, four falcon species, Sandhill bring water and lots of snacks and a lunch. A spotting Cranes, Mountain Plover, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Burrowing Owl, Mountain Bluebird, and American Redstart. We usually tally over 100 species, and don't have to Sunday, January 27, 2019 count individuals (for an opportunity to count every single bird on and around the sea, join us at the Salton Sea North Christmas Bird Count). We will meet at the Salton Sea National Wildlife Refuge Headquarters parking lot at 7:00 am (map). We will bird around the Imperial Valley and south end of the sea.

### Saturday, January 19, 2019 - 7:30 am Seal Beach NWR Brad Singer (909) 936-5087 and Tom Benson

Located next to the Pacific Ocean on the border of Orange and Los Angeles Counties, the Seal Beach National Wildlife Refuge hosts a wonderful array of raptors, shorebirds, waders, herons, rails, ducks, and sparrows. Because the refuge sits on an active naval weapons base, access is by special permit only. Field trips to the refuge regularly see Pacific Golden-Plover, Ferruginous Hawk, Ridgway's Rail, Large-billed Savannah Sparrow, and the much sought after Nelson's Sparrow. Other rarities include Reddish Egret, Short-eared Owl, Lapland Longspur, and Cackling Goose. SBVAS has booked a trip during high tide, so that the sparrows and rails can be seen more easily. This is a half-day trip to the Refuge. Following our stay there, we will have lunch and then pursue wintering rarities in the nearby vicinity in the afternoon. Space is extremely limited on this trip. There is a two-week vetting process by the Navy for all visitors. For those wishing to attend, please email me at by the end of December.

### **Bearpaw Ranch**

Bearpaw Ranch is a 70 acre nature sanctuary, operated by the San Bernardino Audubon Society and may be visited 7 days a week from dawn 'til dusk by members of Audubon and their guests. Bearpaw Ranch is nestled on the north slope of scenic Mill Creek Canyon at 4,500 feet elevation, surrounded by the towering peaks of the San Bernardino National Forest. To reach Bearpaw Ranch, take Highway 38 to the Forest Falls turnoff. Go several car lengths on Valley of the Falls Dr. and look for our small wooden sign on the right. Our driveway is on the right, marked 38801. driveway is paved and unpaved road that meanders across Mill Creek wash and up the bluff to an electronically operated entry gate. *Members* who wish to visit the Sanctuary should call any board member in advance to get the gate code. It is not a requirement that the caretaker is at home for you to visit. If the gate does not open because of mechanical failure, you are welcome to walk in or stop for birding along the creek bed.

San Jacinto, this park is accessed by the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway (<a href="https://www.pstramway.com/">https://www.pstramway.com/</a>); heavy fee. There are many miles of hiking trails in the subalpine forests and fern-bordered mountain meadows.
