From the Black Oystercatcher to Black Gold: Challenges and Opportunities in Alaska a program by Taldi Walter

Alaska is the largest of our states, encompassing more than 600,000 sq. miles of rugged mountains, grinding glaciers, endless tundra, diverse temperate rainforest, and winding coast lines. From the Spectacled Eider and Yellow-billed Loon found in America's Arctic to the Black Oystercatcher and the Marbled Godwit found on the southern coastline, Alaska's birdlife diversity is astounding. Alaska also has an abundance of other iconic wildlife species including grizzlies, caribou, Bald Eagles, humpback whales and wolves, many of which are endangered elsewhere. The current administration and some members of congress have advocated vastly accelerating the extraction of oil, gas, and mineral deposits in this important ecological area. Audubon seeks a balance between resource extraction and protecting internationally critical habitat.

Taldi Walter joined the National Audubon Society's Washington DC Policy Office as the Alaska Field Coordinator, after the recent completion of her Masters degree in Biology. Taldi will present an informative slideshow showcasing some of the important natural areas and brilliant birds found in wild Alaska. The presentation will explore some of Alaska's natural treasures set aside decades ago for the benefit of wildlife and the American public. She will highlight the imminent and compelling challenges and opportunities facing the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, Tongass National Forest, Chugach National Forest, and National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska.

Wildlife Art Festival 2006

The San Bernardino County Museum will host the 24th annual Wildlife Art Festival on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, November 17, 18, and 19, 2006 in Redlands, California.

Twenty-three prominent wildlife artists will exhibit their paintings, sculptures, carvings, and limited edition prints in the museum's Hall of History and Schuiling Gallery. Organized by the San Bernardino County Museum Association, the festival will also include top entries from this year's Federal Duck Stamp Contest, Junior Federal Duck Stamp Contest, and California State Junior Duck Stamp Contest. Festival hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday. The Wildlife Art Festival began when top paintings from the federal Duck Stamp Competition were first shown on the West Coast in 1983 at the San Bernardino County Museum. From this exhibit of small, exquisitely detailed paintings, the festival has grown and evolved over the years while maintaining its focus on wildlife and conservation.

Since 1987, an "Artist of the Year" is selected every year to produce a work of art as a signature piece for that year's event. This year, Gary R. Johnson from Encinitas, California, will present "The Trumpeters' Duet." Signed limited edition prints along with the original painting will be featured at the festival.

The San Bernardino County Museum is at the California Street exit from Interstate 10 in Redlands. Admission is \$6 (adult), \$5 (student or senior), and \$4 (child aged 5 to 12). Children under five and Museum Association members are admitted free. Parking is free.

Ah, cooler weather, wintering birds of prey and waterfowl, coastal sage scrub and wetlands, all close by. Please join us for our fall field trip to the northern San Jacinto Valley. We have two goals for this trip. First is to have fun. Second, is to see 100 species. We always accomplish the first goal and have come very close to the second. Maybe this is the year -- Mystic Lake is full. The northern San Jacinto Valley is known for its high species diversity. We have ranked highest in number of bird species seen for inland areas in North America for Audubon's Christmas Bird Counts, and are usually in the top 1-2% for all counts. At the heart of the region is the public San Jacinto Wildlife Area.

From Riverside go south on 215 then east on Ramona Expressway. Turn north (left) on Davis Road which soon becomes dirt. The entrance to the wildlife area is approximately 3 miles down Davis Road on the right. Turn here and the parking area will be on your left. You can no longer enter the wildlife area from the north.

The road can be extremely slippery if there have been recent rains...

This trip at times has been called the "waterfowl trip," the "goose trip," and "a wonderful field-trip." It is all of that, and more. Perhaps a glimpse at last year's list will help stoke the fires of desire: American white pelican, white-faced ibis, snow goose (thousands), Ross' goose (hundreds), surf scoter, white-winged scoter, peregrine falcon, prairie falcon, sandhill crane (hundred), mountain plover (hundred and a half), and gila woodpecker. We tallied twenty species of waterfowl, and we didn't have to count individuals.

We will meet at the Wister Unit of the Salton Sea National Wildlife Refuge at 7:00 a.m. Wister is on Highway 111, east side of the Sea, several miles before Niland. The turn-off is Davis Road.

We will bird around the southern end of the Sea, then go south into "ag" lands to look for raptors, mountain plovers, and the always entertaining sandhill cranes.

leaders who gathered today in support of Proposition 84 - the Clean Water and Coastal Protection Bond Act. County Public Health Director Dr. Eric Frykman, Supervisor Josie Gonzales, State Senator Nell Soto and representatives from the Inland Empire Utilities Agency (IEUA) held a press conference at the IEUA's Desalter Facility in Chino to raise awareness of the funding resources that Proposition 84 will bring to the Inland Empire.

Proposition 84, on the November statewide ballot, is supported by San Bernardino County, City of Ontario, Inland Empire Utilities Agency, Inland Valley Chamber Alliance, Santa Ana Watershed Project Authority, and the Cucamonga Valley Water District because it will help meet the water infrastructure needs of this fast growing area, and funds clean water programs for residents and businesses.

"Too little resources have been dedicated to monitoring and maintaining the safety of our local water supply," said Dr. Frykman. "Proposition 84 bolsters these resources thus continuing to ensure our families have safe water to drink. It further increases resources to build and preserve a healthy environment in which we raise our children."

"More than 450 ground water wells are polluted with perchlorate and other contaminants across California, and leaders across all party lines and constituencies are working together to find workable solutions," said State Senator Nell Soto, chair of the Senate Select Committee on Perchlorate Contamination. "Proposition 84 funds water quality programs to treat local water sources and to help clean up the Santa Ana River watershed."

In the Inland Empire, Proposition 84 provides \$114 million to the Santa Ana Sub-Region Integrated Regional Water Management District for water quality and water management efforts, and \$45 million to Santa Ana River Parkway improvements.

"The county's new water treatment facility delivers clean drinking water to local homes and businesses, but much more needs to be done to expand and operate regional facilities," said Supervisor Gonzales. "Proposition 84 brings millions of dollars directly to local water agencies and municipalities to protect our drinking water sources. It's a win-win for everyone who has worked hard to solve this dangerous health issue."

Under Proposition 84, local governments and water interests can apply for money through the following funding sources:

- \$240 million Safe Drinking Water Fund to help meet local water quality needs, provide emergency safe drinking water, and to meet the new State standards to clean up water contamination;
- \$80 million for clean water needs;
- \$60 million to clean up groundwater contamination;
- \$90 million for stormwater cleanup; and
- \$180 million to smaller agricultural-based communities to clean up nitrate and other agricultural-based contaminants. "Water agencies simply need more resources to abate pervasive water contamination in the Inland Valley," said Angel

In 1934, with the passage of the Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp Act (Act), an increasingly concerned Nation took firm action to stop destruction of migratory waterfowl and the wetlands so vital to their survival. Under this Act, all waterfowl hunters 16 years of age and over must annually purchase and carry a Federal Duck Stamp. Most hunters willingly pay the stamp price to ensure the survival of our natural resources.

Approximately 98 cents of every duck stamp dollar goes directly into the Migratory Bird Conservation Fund to purchase wetlands and wildlife habitat for inclusion into the National Wildlife Refuge System - a fact that ensures this land will be protected and available for all generations to come. Since 1934, better than \$540 million has gone into that Fund to purchase more than 4 million acres of habitat. Little wonder the Federal Duck Stamp Program has been called one of the most successful conservation programs ever initiated.

In recent years, with the hunter population dwindling, three groups of Americans have had an increasing role in filling the gap in the purchase of Federal Duck Stamps - collectors, art enthusiasts and other conservationists. Collectors and art enthusiasts consider these stamps "miniature pieces of art."

The collection of duck stamps is a growing and constantly evolving phenomenon. A collector who had purchased each of the current stamps, at issue price, would have spent around \$300. This investment today would be worth well over \$4,000. Other conservationists buy the stamps as a way of ensuring that these wild places will be around for all generations. And, possession of the most recent Federal Duck Stamp provides free admission into all National Wildlife Refuges.

The purchase of a Federal Duck Stamp provides an opportunity for every United States citizen to take a stand in the preservation of our natural heritage. All of us, working together, can and have made a difference.

Each year the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service sponsors the only Federally-mandated art competition at its headquarters in Washington, D.C. Wildlife artists, both professional and amateur, all across the United States vie for the coveted title of Federal Duck Stamp Artist. Santiago, Board Member for the Inland Empire Utilities Agency. "Proposition 84 funds will help finance construction of critically needed water supply projects, such as additional desalters for the Chino Basin and the regional Chino Basin Groundwater Recharge Program. The funds will also help pay for unfunded mandates to meet new water standards."

Proposition 84 has bipartisan support from more than 500 organizations and leaders across California, including: Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein, Association of California Water Agencies, Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, Western Growers Association, League of California Cities, and the Southern California Public Health Association. 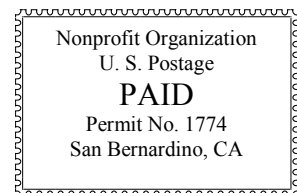
